The Dean will also be initiating a process of service review to gauge the feelings of members on the types and frequency of services that the Cathedral will offer. 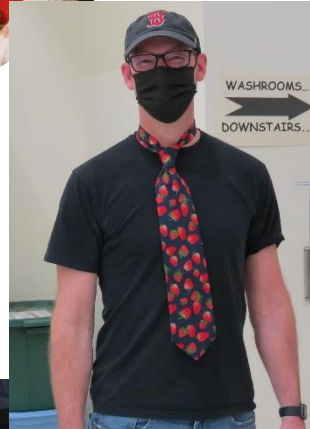

Terminology in Church

Terminology in any religious denomination can be puzzling and Anglicans are no exception. Let's take a look at some of these terms, starting with the church building.



The word **sanctuary** causes much confusion. In the Protestant or Reformed tradition this often refers to the church building where worship is conducted. But in Anglican parlance, the sanctuary refers to a limited area around the altar. It's actually part of the **chancel**, which is the raised area at the front (usually east) end of the church where you find the altar, the bishop's chair, clergy seating, and in some churches the choir. In a traditional "cruciform" (cross-shaped) church there are two wings called "**transepts**" adjacent to the chancel. In St. Paul's Cathedral, the choir and organ console are located in the south transept, while the north transept houses the organ pipes.

The main part of the church where the congregation is seated is the **nave**. At the back or west end of the nave in our church is the **baptistry**, a raised platform for the **font**, where baptism is administered. Our Cathedral has a **chapel** in the north-east corner – a kind of mini-church with its own altar, used for private prayer and for the "reserved sacrament" of consecrated bread and wine. We also have a **cloister**, the arched addition along the north wall of the nave, providing an entrance to the nave and a space for gatherings and processions. And beneath the Cathedral is the **columbarium**, a resting place for the ashes of the deceased. If you can navigate all this, you have cracked the code of our Cathedral building!

Historical note: St. Paul's Cathedral is the oldest place of worship in Regina. The nave, built in 1894-95, is the fourth-oldest building in the city. The chancel and transepts were added in 1906. The chapel was built in 1949. The columbarium was opened in 1993 and the cloister in 2014 – both winning architectural heritage awards.
