

The Dean's Discretionary Fund enables the Dean to respond confidentially to identified needs of the vulnerable people in our neighbourhood, in our congregation, and in our diocese that arise through the course of the year which include being able to provide groceries for a family in need, and coffee and small meals for hungry and cold folks in our neighbourhood.

As the Cathedral of the Diocese of Qu'Appelle, we are also committed to looking after the clergy of the diocese of Qu'Appelle when needs have arisen with non-insured medication for their children, helping to cover a gap in house payments, or helping with the cost of ongoing professional training.

WARDEN'S REPORT: FINALIZING 2025 & LOOKING AHEAD TO 2026

During the last couple of months, Donna, our Treasurer, has worked very hard preparing the operating budget for 2026. Following an initial review by Vestry in November, the draft is ready for presentation to and approval by the Vestry in December. At the cathedral's Annual General Meeting on the 22nd of February attendees will have an opportunity review and receive clarification on points contained in the budget.

As everyone knows, there are 7 stained-glass windows away in Winnipeg being restored by Matthew at Prairie Studio Glass. We expect these windows to be ready for installation in late Spring 2026. Then, we will send another group of windows to Winnipeg to continue our round of restoration for our beautiful windows here at St. Paul's.

You may be wondering about the status of our fencing – a project discussed at a Town Hall meeting in 2025 and subsequently conditionally approved by Vestry pending a number of financial clarifications. An application for financial assistance from a federal government program was submitted in the spring. We have not heard back from the federal government about the grant we applied for. This money was meant to help us pay for the fencing and landscaping. Now it is too late for us to begin this work in 2025, it is a project we now hope to undertake and complete in 2026.

The Bishop has reminded every parish in the Diocese about the protocols in the "Safe Church" document. Vestry, the Treasurer and the Wardens are working on documenting our policies and procedures. While many of these are well established, we will be reviewing these and updating them as necessary. The goal is to have an Administration Policy & Procedure Manual so that everyone knows how things work here at St. Paul's.

As usual it has been a busy fall at St. Paul's. We thank the members of Vestry for their dedication and thoughtful debate while making important and difficult decisions concerning the health and growth of the Cathedral.


