Message from Dean Mike Sinclair

There are many questions about when we will reopen for worship, and what this will look like. While the province has allowed for 150 people in places of worship, the restrictions on space, numbers, and activity are substantial. Bishop Hardwick has issued a letter allowing for congregations to gather in numbers no greater than 30, adhering to all provincial and diocesan safety guidelines. These include but are not limited to: the requirement for online pre-registration for church, including a statement of one's health; temperature checks at the door; mandatory masks; arranged and assigned seating; 2 metre distancing; no eucharist; no singing; no contact; separate entrance and exit, with organized entry and exit flow; full sanitization between services.

In light of the current safety and logistical concerns, vestry has agreed to suspend public worship until September. This decision was not arrived at easily or lightly. We thank you for your understanding and patience, and pray for the time that we can again joyfully and safely meet face to face. The situation will undoubtedly continue to evolve and we'll keep you posted via the News Bulletin.

"Hole in the World" is a song by the Eagles, written by Don Henley and Glenn Frey in response to the September 11, 2001 attacks and released in their 2003 farewell tour. It's about the lack of love and understanding among people. The lyrics go something like this: "There's a hole in the world tonight; there's a cloud of fear and sorrow; they tell me there's a place over yonder, cool water running through the burning sand, until we learn to love one another we will never reach the promised land; there's a hole in

the world tonight - don't let there be a hole in the world tomorrow."

Maybe we have always been living with a hole in the world. It is especially brought to our attention by the pandemic and by the focus on how racism is rampant in our world. I see a similarity between the lyrics in this song of the need to have loving concern for one another and the gospel message "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength. This is the first and the great commandment. The second is like it: Love your neighbor as yourself."

We suffer sorrow when we are away from our family, friends and church community. But it is necessary for us to be apart the sake of the health of our nation. The murder of George Floyd has brought to focus again as a reminder that racism and inequality among people still exists in our world and in our nation and in our communities. People are living in fear because of mistreatment because of their skin colour.

We are called to serve the Lord where we live and work as Christ-bearers living his life, making Jesus present in a world that would otherwise conceal him. We are free to choose to serve the Lord and help close the hole in the world.

Vestry Report

Vestry met online on June 16. **Dean Mike Sinclair** reported on plans for a Cathedral YouTube channel (https://www.youtube.com/channel/UCrhG6UTVzhMa3ilqaoTcbWA), which will make it possible to involve more people in leadership of virtual worship. The Facebook broadcast has attracted followers who would not normally attend church. Churchwardens **Pam Kendel-Goodale** and **Ian Yeates** outlined a project for major cleaning and reorganization of storage in the Cathedral buildings this summer. Treasurer **Donna MacIntosh** reported a positive financial situation at the end of May. Associate priest the **Rev. Ed Dunfield** provided an update on the restoration of the wainscoting in the nave, which should be completed by early July, and plans for repairing the frames of the stained glass windows.

Vestry approved terms of reference for the Communications & Welcoming Committee. The committee is to continue publication of the biweekly News Bulletin and will prepare a communications strategy for the Cathedral. Vestry also approved a proposal from warden Pam Kendel-Goodale to share the funds raised for the Bishop's Easter appeal between Carmichael Outreach, the YWCA Shelter, and Qu'Appelle House seniors' residence.
